

Contra Dancing in Santa Barbara Still a Bargain

With a headline like that, you knowsomething's up. In this case, the price of admission to SBCDS dances, effective December 1995, is \$6, visiting artists higher.

"Why?" you may reasonably ask.

Basically, expenses are up and income is not, and our dances are not even breaking even. One significant increase in expenses is that in June of 1994 we began paying performers more.

If the admission price is a financial burden, many volunteer duties are acknowledged with dance passes. Also, you can bring two people who are new to contra dance to a dance and you get in free.

For what it's worth, the \$5 price has been in effect since May 1990. For a sideways

look at the situation, see the chart on page 4, which compares going to the movies with going to a contra dance.

How can we keep dance prices down? One way is to increase attendance. The editor (writing as an individual) has some thoughts on this; see page 2.

Also effective December 1995: Dances are half-price after the break.


Ribbons and Bells, Hankies and Sticks

It's a showy tradition, Morris dancing is, with dancers bedecked with ribbons and bells waving hankies or clashing sticks in complex patterns. Those of you who have watched us dance at the contra dance break may not understand the total significance of this ancient English custom.

Morris is a form of celebratory dance that has been done for hundreds of years. dances are usually done with six dancers moving in standard figures, such as foot up and back-to-back with additional steps with odd names like squash beetles, uprights, and hooklegs.

Some people dance Morris to take part in this living tradition, others simply because it's fun. Those of us who love it expound on the joys of dancing Morris: the snap of the hankies, the jingle of bells, the clashing of sticks. It is also the team effort



It is referenced not only in Shakespearean plays but also in many other writings of the time. It has often been associated with fertility and pagan rites, though the true story of its origins is lost in the Middle Ages. The dance originated in the Cotswold section of England, just above and to the east of London.

Traditionally done by farmers in May to celebrate the beginning of summer, each town had its own distinct variation of Morris. These distinctions were named after the town where they originated, such as Sherbourne, Bampton, and Oddington. The main differences are in how hankies are used, what beat is emphasized, or by variations in the steps. The non-Morris watcher may mostly see the difference between hanky and stick dances, but there are many variations both between traditions and within each tradition. The

to develop tight coordination, to keep the action together and, forever, to keep the lines straight. All this is true, but Morris is more than that to me. It is also the community of close-knit friends joined in a common interest that makes it so important. It still has excitement and challenge after ten years of dancing Morris. I still love it, through sprained ankles, bad knees, and hot, sweaty performance days.

Monarch Grove Morris is a new team (two years old) and we have danced out at the Santa Barbara Botanical Gardens, the S.B. Zoo, the Wharf, the Farmers Market, and the latest California Ale (a gathering of Morris teams from up and down the West Coast). We invite you to join us at practice at 7:30 Thursday nights at 1549 Sycamore Canyon. All levels of dance experience are welcome. Also join us on January 21 before the contra dance, from 6

Thoughts on Increasing Attendance

I would like participation at our dances to increase for two reasons. First, I get so much from contra dancing that I would like others to be able to have the experience too. Second, I hope it would lead to more dances. More dances would mean more opportunities to dance, more opportunities for bands and callers (existing, new and out-oftown), and hopefully more volunteer energy.

One way to increase attendance is to increase the return rate of new dancers. I suggest that we seek out new people at our dances, of both sexes, and introduce ourselves; help them feel welcome; help them feel that they are a part of what is happening. Seek them out regardless of age or our own perception of attractiveness. And of course, dance with them. They are the future of contra dancing in our community. The introductory workshops, while helpful for many, can never take the place of the real, "whole" learning that takes place in the context of real dancing to real music with patient, compassionate, experienced dancers.


Carpinteria Open Band
