A big thank you to everybody who responded to the dance survey mailed with the last Dance Star. The survey responses were generally positive. Overall, most respondents seem happy with the Santa Barbara dances.

We had a total of 127 surveys turned in! The responses came from a wide cross section of the Santa Barbara contra dance community, including some L.A. & San

Summer and Fall on the Dance Floor

Unprecedented! Six dances in June, and a dance every weekend through September 1.

Kitchen Junket begins our schedule on June 2 and then disappears until fall. On June 7, calendar maker Cara Moore returns to our calendar after a three year absence for a team-calling engagement, music by the Hot Flashes. If you haven't been to a Goleta dance lately (or ever), we're having fun without you (even though we miss you). Check it out!

Two days later, June 9, it's a *free!* dance in honor of an upcoming wedding (see notice on page 3).

On June 16, Rounder recording artists Ralph Blizard and the New Southern Ramblers descend from the hills and the Live Oak Music Festival to play for a dance guaranteed to be breathtaking. Ralph Blizard, master fiddler from Tennessee, is one of the country's best old-time fiddlers. Phil Jamison, a nationally known caller, musician and clogger, plays guitar and bass with the Ramblers, and has over 20 years of calling experience. Rounding out the group are John Lilly on guitar, mandolin and bass, and John Herrman

on banjo and bass.

From, well, the 805 area code (Oxnard, Frazier Park and Taft) we welcome for the first time the Strawberry Patch String Band, playing our second Oak Park dance of the year on June 22 along with caller Carl Magagnosc.

After that, we just have more great dances, one after the other, starting with Susan Michaels and the band New Young Buzzards on June 30, and continuing with a variety of callers and bands (and dancers!).

In Goleta on August 9, **Spin Cycle**, an L.A. band, also makes its local debut.

Luis Obispo dancers. 59 of the respondents identified themselves as very experienced contra dancers, 58 as moderately experienced, and 10 as beginners.

In designing the survey, we saw it as a great way to get feedback from the people who attend Santa Barbara's contra dances. We wanted to keep a neutral tone, creating a forum to raise issues and identify areas for possible improvements. The survey is in no sense a vote, not directly proposing any changes or actions. Nor can it be considered a scientific survey. But hopefully, the survey will serve to open new doors, stimulating creative ideas and discussion.

Also, we want to acknowledge the SBCDS Board for their cooperation with the creation of this survey. Over the last few months, the Board has given over significant portions of their meeting time to discuss our project. We thank them for their assistance and general support of the survey, as well as for sponsoring the printing and mailing of the survey in the last Dance Star.

The two tables on this page show survey responses as percentages. Non responses are not tabulated, so the number of responses on which the percentages are based for a particular question may be less

than 127.

Each entry in the tables shows the percentage of that response among actual responses to that particular question.

(Each entry in the tables above shows the percentage of all people answering that question who marked the particular response.)

As said earlier, we designed the survey to help raise possible issues for discussion. With all the hand written comments on the surveys, together with looking at respondents from the different experience levels as separate groups, the survey presents a huge amount of information.

In this issue, we are only showing the two tables giving total responses from all experience levels combined. At this early stage in reviewing the survey results, we only want to point out some of the most immediately apparent patterns in the responses. More information and analysis will be presented in the fall issue.

To start, the Carrillo Ballroom got an

overwhelming clear approval from all groups. The dance hall received the most unanimous approval of any item on the survey. At the same time, people indicated that, while the Carrillo Ballroom was a plus to their evening, it was not one of their highest priorities.

Overall, people indicated that the callers, the bands, and the general energy level of the dance were the highest priority ingredients in a great evening of contra dancing. While most respondents were basically positive

about these areas, the callers and the general energy level drew a number of negative responses and a generally less clear overall approval than other areas.

In general, there are some differences in the responses from people who identified themselves as beginners, moderately experienced, or very experienced. The respondents from the very experienced group often had more pointed or critical comments then the other groups, placing major focus on callers, variety, and a challenging energetic evening. Beginners had many fewer negative comments, focusing more on the importance of a friendly, open social environment, and the need for clear effective teaching.

Among respondents who said they had experience contra dancing outside of Santa Barbara, many said our dances provide a friendlier environment than most. However, some indicated a preference for the out-of-town dances. One common thread across the experience levels was a desire for more variety and more out-of-town callers and bands. Also, all the groups showed a sense that the Santa Barbara dance succeeds in presenting a very friendly, open social environment.

Again, thank you to everyone who has helped make this survey happen. Putting on this survey has given us a fascinating glimpse of the wide range of personalities that come together at the dance. Hopefully, out of this forum, which has brought out an amazingly diverse range of dancer opinions and comments, something positive will happen. See you at the dance!

Thanks also to Kelli and David, who have invested an incredible amount of time and effort to the survey project, with more to come.
