Performer Spotlight

Two bands make their SBCDS debut in the next few weeks. We shine the first spotlights in this new series on them.



The **Bungalow Band**'s first Santa Barbara gig was actually at a conference in May. They return to

play for the Sprung Floor Dance Festival, and again for a Sunday night dance on June 27.

The Bungalow Band began playing publicly in 1997 on Andy Cameron's front porch, which is in the "Bungalow Heaven" neighborhood of Pasadena. The occasion was the annual Bungalow Heaven Home Tour. Since then they've played at subsequent tours and for local occasions like Sundays in the Park. They began playing contra dances as a group in 1998, although all had played dances individually before then.

The band consists of Carol Burrill on hammered dulcimer, Ned Boyer on recorder, John Johnston on fiddle, Mimi see **SPOTLIGHT**, next page

Scheel on mandolin and lap dulcimer, and Andy Cameron on guitar. They play string band music mostly of the traditional American type, both northern and southern, both old and new.

Their combination of instruments is a bit different than the usual; Carol's hammered dulcimer and Ned's recorder contribute to that difference. Mimi brings a long history of playing this genre of music and John has played extensively in Pennsylvania, New York and Arizona before joining the band. One of John's "claims to fame" is that he was present at the debut of Jay Ungar's tune "Ashoken Farewell," which became famous as music for the PBS "Civil War" series.



Lime in the Harp makes its SB debut on June 20, Father's Day. Appropriate for the occasion, two of the

band's members, John and Seth, are father and son, respectively.

Lime in the Harp came into being about eight years ago when the leaders of the ongoing open contra dance band in San Diego finally surrendered. Several smaller groups coalesced out of the open contra dance band, including Lime in the Harp.

The band was named after a question arising from the barman in an English pub where the original and, as yet, anonymous trio was holding a session for free beer. When John Odam ordered a Harp lager, he was asked: "Do you want lime in the Harp?" Hence the name. Like many bands, Lime in the Harp has undergone many changes of lineup in its time but the core band has been John Odam, plus Janet Ashford and Chris Davis. Other musicians that have served with distinction include Marc Hansen, one of the original trio, Peter Damashek, and Lista Duren. This year the band lost a founder and its longest continuous serving band member when fiddler Janet Ashford left San Diego to live in Mendocino. The current "Limeup" features Chris Davis on fiddle, Seth Odam on guitar, and John Odam on the rare mandocello, a guitar-sized mandolin in cello tuning. Lime's musical approach is to take lively Irish session tunes and tailor them to contradance. Driven by Chris's

Veteran caller asks

What am I doing in the *Dance Star*?

Indeed, what am I doing here? It's because the editor sent me this email: "This might be a little late, but would you like any editorial responsibilities for this [summer] issue? If not, we'll talk about the fall issue."

Now I really didn't have any ideas as to why me, or what to write about, so he suggested several topics, including the current one, so here goes.

It seems like all my life I've been asked to do something I hadn't planned on, with interesting results.

and I were just starting to square dance and we were asked if we could teach a church group how to do it. After all, we knew how to dance. How difficult can it be to call? You just get some music and tell people what to do next. Right? Just ask some of our own first time callers. That's how I got started calling.

I was in the Marine Corps in the 50's and volunteered for a unit called "Special Services." It was special alright! We packaged and managed troop entertainment. From movies to movie star tours. Talk

fiery fiddle style that he learned as a student in Dublin, the band features the throaty roar of the mandocello, complimented by the melodic picking of Seth's guitar. Unique sound. Compelling rhythm. Driving fiddle. Makes you want to get up and dance! about hard times in the USMC.

Back in the 60's I was asked to do a radio promo for a local political organization I was in, no doubt because I had a loud mouth. I guess I did OK because I was soon doing a weekend gig on the local station. Over the course of the next two decades I found myself on over 30 Easy Listening music stations across the country.

All of which brings me to the 90's when Shirley and I ventured up to Santa Barbara from L.A to check out the sprung floor and a contra dance listed in a California Dance Co-op publication.

I've now retired and comfortable with no more surprises. That is, until Gary interrupted it all.

What's the point, you may ask? It's this. When someone asks for your help or input, give it a try. You will never know what interesting journey may be ahead until you venture out.

The SBCDS has asked for people to help carry the responsibilities of this wonderful dance. How many have eagerly volunteered to give a hand? Seems like the same few keep on holding our dance together. I know all about the fear of not "doing it right." In most cases you won't see **JOURNEY**, page 4
